We provide and plan for a wide range of opportunities for children to develop spiritually in all areas of the curriculum, particularly though RE, English, Maths, PSHE, Science, Humanities, Art and Music. We provide opportunities for reflection, including silence and stillness.

### Curriculum

We are particularly proud of our unique Skylark curriculum. We have devised a curriculum that is meaningful, purposeful and relevant to the children who live in this area of East Sussex, nestled at the foot of the South Downs.

The area is rich with local history, geography and creativity. We use these subjects as the drives for our curriculum allowing our children to truly immerse themselves in a project-based curriculum where subject specific skills are explicitly taught in a planned, age-appropriate developmental way. Through the Skylark curriculum, children are taught the importance of analysis as the key to understanding.

We aim to put our children at the centre of their own learning and place great emphasis on nurturing skills and attitudes such as resourcefulness, resilience and co-operation. Our teachers bring the National Curriculum alive by making links between the individual subjects and applying them to whole school 'Projects'. Our children also benefit from specialist tuition in sport on a weekly basis.

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## Curriculum

### The curriculum is divided into three stages:

- 1. Early Years Foundation Stage EYFS: from ages 4-5
- 2. Key Stage 1: from ages 5-7
- Key Stage 2: from ages 7-11



#### **Early Years**

The Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum is based on the Government's Early Learning Goals with seven areas of learning:

- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Communication and Language
- Physical Development
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

The children in Early Years are also taught Religious Education. In Early Years we use *Tapestry* software to communicate with parents.

### **Enriched Curriculum**

#### **Trips and Workshops**

The children are often taken on educational visits to complement their learning in school. Some of the places we have recently visited include Battle Abbey, Lewes Castle and Cuckmere Haven. We have also had a workshop on the Benin Kingdom, immersing the children in those times and experiences.

#### Residential

Each year our Year 6 children experience a residential trip to Bowles Activity Centre.

#### Celebrations

We love to celebrate with our children their successes individually and as a group. We also celebrate events in the Christian calendar including Easter and Harvest.





#### **Events**

We have termly STEM days and have arranged trips to a local school to use their science laboratories. We take part in the annual Patina parade too! We have two productions at Christmas; the Key Stage 1 nativity play and the Key Stage 2 carol concert. We also hold a Key Stage 2 production in the summer term.



### Forest School, Sport, Clubs and Pupil Voice

#### **Forest School**

We are very fortunate that the children have access to the Wild about Barcombe area for forest school. There, children follow a full programme with our forest school staff. Every year group gets at least a six-week session and a whole day away from school, learning new skills.

#### Sport

We believe that physical development is a key component to success across the whole curriculum and we have excellent PE provision. Our children take part in a range of sports within class PE lessons, as well as regular inter-federation events. Children also benefit from weekly specialist sports coaches. #### Clubs

We have a thriving after school club which runs until 5.30pm Monday to Thursday. We also have a number of specialist clubs that change and can include: - French, Football, Dance, Art, and Tag Rugby.

#### **Pupil Voice**

Our student councillors and eco councillors are elected from every class. They have regular meetings to discuss the school and make recommendations. We also have librarians, digital leaders, play leaders and house captains.



### Inclusion

#### Special Education Needs and Disabilities

We are committed to working in partnership with parents and carers in involving them and their children in decisions about learning and progress. Arrangements are in place in school to support pupils with medical conditions. Pupils with SEND are encouraged to participate fully in the life of the school and in any wider community activity.

We believe that all children need to feel safe, happy and valued at school to learn, progress, and develop their well-being. We recognise the individuality of all children and the fact that they are at different levels of development, physically, emotionally, intellectually and socially. Staff recognise the need for differentiation in setting tasks for their pupils. Teachers regularly hold pupil progress meetings with leadership and the SENCo to discuss any interventions required to support each child.

#### **Gifted and Talented**

We recognise that all children are individuals with their own specific needs, gifts and talents. Children who are identified as being exceptionally able or talented are monitored and provided with stimulating and enriching lessons appropriate to their needs. For older pupils, this is provided in conjunction with other schools.

#### **School Uniform**

Pupils at Barcombe School all wear school uniform. Uniform is important; it is practical, appropriate and helps create a sense of community. "He is enjoying being challenged and continues to love learning new things."
